ABOUT THE CIRCUIT



The Circuit de Monaco is 3,337 meters long and has 18 corners. Overtaking on the Monaco Circuit is very difficult. The track is not made for current Formula 1 cars.

The circuit is so narrow and that is why it is also called one of the most difficult races of the year. The 2003 race even had no overtaking moments at all. The most famous point of the circuit is the Grand Hotel Hairpin. The hairpin bend is the slowest bend in the entire Formula 1 season.

Record winner of Monaco is Ayrton Senna. He won the race no fewer than six times between 1987 and 1993. After him come Michael Schumacher and Graham Hill, each with five victories.



HOW DO I GET TO THE CIRCUIT?

The best way to get to the Monaco Circuit varies from where you stay. In general there are many trains to Monaco. The train station is located on the Hill behind the Sainte Devote bend. It is easy to find your spots as everything is well marked and there are signs everywhere.

From Nice and Ventimiglia it is about 20 minutes by train to Monte Carlo. We recommend to buy a ticket in advance.

ENTRANCE GATES

Are you curious at which entrance you can enter?

- Entrance 1: Le Rocher (General Admission)
- Entrance 2: Grandstand N, O, P, V
- Entrance 3: Grandstand T, X
- Entrance 4: Grandstand L
- Entrance 6: Grandstands K4-K6
- Entrance 7: Grandstands A, A1, Z1
- Entrances 8 and 9: Grandstand B
- Entrance 10: Grandstand C

OPENING HOURS

The road on which the circuit is located on is closed to traffic and pedestrians every morning during the Grand Prix weekend between from 6:00 AM. From then on, you can visit the circuit if you have a ticket.

The road reopens after the finish between 6:00 PM and 9:00 PM.





SANITARY FACILITIES

There are sufficient (temporary) toilets available on the circuit. Look out for signs directing you to the nearest toilet. In general, the toilets are kept very clean. The toilets can be very busy during a Grand Prix weekend, espeically right before a Formula 1 session.



There are plenty of food and drink stands on the circuit. There are also many local cafes located on the circuit and open during the weekend. You may bring your own food and drinks, but please note: you are not allowed to take glass onto the circuit.



WALKING DISTANCE ON CIRCUIT

During a Grand Prix weekend, expect plenty of walking. Hence, opt for comfortable shoes and attire to avoid blisters and discomfort. Pick clothing that allows easy movement, ensuring you can fully enjoy the event.



It is allowed to take photos on the circuit with a simple camera for personal use. Pay attention to others and avoid obstructing their view. Be respectful to fellow spectators.







WEATHER AND CLIMATE

At the end of May in Monaco, the climate during the day is usually pleasant and sunny. Temperatures are usually between 20°C and 25°C. The sun shines often and there is little chance of rain, making it an ideal time to enjoy Monaco's outdoor activities and breathtaking coastline.



The F1 Fan Zone in Monaco is usually located at Place d'Armes. The Fan Zone is a vibrant hub where fans can enjoy entertainment and experience a sense of connection with Formula 1. This is a public space and you do not need a ticket to enter the Fanzone.



END OF THE DAY

Once the on-track action has concluded, the streets of Monaco will be opened to both pedestrians and vehicles every evening during the race weekend. A visit to the Monaco Grand Prix is not complete without a walk around the circuit and its sights!
